ENGAGING WITH MAKERSPACES

THE AUSTRALIAN EDUCATION REPORTER - TERM 4 2018 - BY EMMA DAVIES



To address future learning skills, Paddington Public School (NSW) implemented a STEAM MakerSpace as part of its STEAM strategy. All Images: Paddington Public School.

AFTER researching future focused learning, teachers at Paddington Public School realised the importance of teaching Future Focused Learning skills and the need to increase student engagement – particularly for students in upper primary.

"As a school our aim was to become a leader in STEAM and to provide students with the skills to be able to effectively solve complex problems, think critically, be creative, communicate and collaborate with one another," Paddington Public School learning designer Jeff Johnson said.

"STEAM, particularly project-based learning (PBL) STEAM, fit perfectly with these aspirations, while holding the potential to improve student outcomes and engagement." Mr Johnson said that involving students, particularly female students, in engaging science activities in their early years of schooling was vital if they were to continue the subject into high school and higher education.

Teachers were also having issues with the schools aging computer lab and poor room design so the MakerSpace was designed as a way of engaging students and enabling them to explore technology as a tool for learning, rather than explicit technology lessons.

In terms of engagement, Mr Johnson said the A or Arts in STEAM was essential. "Through creative planning I found that as students brainstorm solutions to solve an engineering problem, by encouraging them to adopt a playful, inventive or artistic approach, their artistic right brain helped to generate more creative and innovative thinking," he said.

"Of course, design incorporates art and can serve as a practical function. As was evident at Paddington PS through STEAM lessons. "Students regularly applied design to their projects and often decoration to their products to improve the aesthetical appearance, design, and the usability.

"If you allow students to explore their creativity with few boundaries you will be surprised by the amount of art that happens naturally as part of the process."



Paddington Public School had used art in a variety of ways in STEM learning. "For example, a Rube Goldberg machine that instead of the final outcomes being the ringing of a bell or switching on a light switch, knocks over a tub of paint or cup of lentils, which can fall to create an artwork," Mr Johnson said.

"With the use of technology taking an image of the fallen paint or lentils and manipulating image through Photobooth that or Photoshop can further increase the artistic element. "Designing and making cars can obviously include an element of decoration. "But the addition of LEDs to the car roofs with mirrors to refract light and filming the movement of the cars jumping off a ramp in the dark to create light trails, can create an artistic movie that could be shown as part of an exhibition.

"This can link into additional Science outcomes, such as observing how light is absorbed, reflected and refracted and the sources, transfer and transformation of electricity." However, Mr Johnson recommended teachers take their time when experimenting with STEAM teaching.

"It took almost a year for students to get used to a different way of learning and the change from teacher directed learning to student-centered learning," he said. "Even the ability to collaborate effectively with one another took time. "The key was to ensure a team had a common goal in the projects. "An easy way to assist this process was to allow students to mash designs together so everyone in the team had ownership of final product."
